Max Guyer (*Chaja*) was my "uncle," but I don't actually know exactly how we were related. From the time we all immigrated to the U.S., he and his family- including his first wife Zelda (Teifeld), then after her death, his second wife Genia (Zelda's sister), and my "cousins" Aida and Norma- lived in the flat bellow us on Hazelwood and later on Leslie in Detroit. 



Max Guyer's Photo Album of Gombin

When we lived together in Detroit in the 1950s, I was too young to recognize that there was something different about a family that named its two daughters, Aida and Norma; what did we know about opera! In that post-war period, our discussion of Gombin was colored by the tragedy of the Holocaust and by the distressed young concentration camp survivors who were arriving in the U.S. from the European D.P. camps. The background to the story was Gombin as rural shtetl with its Jewish and Polish peasants- the "Tevya story."

But the collection of photos kept by Max Guyer tells a much more complex and nuanced story of Gombin in the interwar period, the 1920s and 30s. These photos show us the wealthy and modern Teifeld family, with five beautiful daughters, of whom two perished in the Holocaust. Look at the quality of the posed photographs, taken at one of several professional photographers in Gombin- "Moderne" and "Z. Rudnick." This was not a peasant family.

In the Spring 2008 issue of B'nai Gombin, we translated much of the article from the Gombin Yizkor book about the drama club. There were also book clubs, political organizations, several daily Yiddish newspapers and sports teams. This set of photos shows the "Maccabies" of Gombin in their weight-lifting outfits. The young men sit in front of a newspaper called the "Folks Tseitung" (People's Newspaper). Did you ever think you would see a photo of wealthy Jews from Gombin

posing on their sailboat on one of the area's small lakes? What is your reaction to the young couples posing with a hunter in leather boots, toting a shot gun? What do you make of the furs, jewelry, posh hats? These photos reveal a sophisticated, modern, educated, worldly side of Gombin. More than Tevya's shtetl.

It was exciting for me to visit Aida (Guyer) Cutler, my childhood cousin and friend, and go through the boxes of Max and Zelda's photographs. Melvin Guyer and his son Matt Guyer were also there. There are hundreds of photos in this treasure trove. Many have notations on the back in either Yiddish or Polish. Some indicate the date and the photographer. Some, of course, are in very bad shape.

Many Gombiner families still have boxes of photographs from their parents and grandparents. It is our duty to find these and attempt to preserve and protect them from further wear and aging. Ideally we would have a group of Gombiners and friends translate the Yiddish and Polish so that we might know more about the lives of Gombiners in this period. The time is rapidly passing when we can hope to identify the people in the photos- but again, we must try. If any of the readers of this article are willing, we should undertake a project to save the photographic heritage of Gombin.
