## President's Gombin Trip Report, July 17-18, 2005

This summer I spent 2 days in Poland, visiting Gombin, Chelmno, Konin, and Sanniki. I stayed in Gombin at the home of Sebastian Balko's parents, Romek and Cecylia, who provided warm hospitality. I also met with several Gombiners, including the mayor, Mr. Krzysztof Jadczak. The purpose of the trip was to begin the preparations for the GJHGS trip in 2006 (see page 4). The following thoughts and ideas were presented at the Annual Meeting in August, 2005.

Gabin [pronounced Gombin in Polish]: There are many new houses- some quite large in the town. On Kilinskega Street many of the pre-war structures we had seen in 1999 have been torn down and replaced with new construction. These people work in Plock, Gostynin and Warsaw and commute daily or weekly. Gabin is becoming more of a desirable community.

The site of the Gombin synagogue: The site is now a parking area for a small food market on Kilinskega Street. (continue p2)

The area going down to the river, where the mikvah stood, is still open brush with houses backing on to it.



**Jewish cemetery**: The cemetery looks good; the vegetation is cut back. The face of the monument has been cleaned, but there is debris around the stones. The entire concrete area and the remaining matzevot need to be cleaned. There is no graffiti or evidence of any vandalism. The gate is always left open.

**Chelmno:** At Chelmno I was fortunate to meet Krzysztof Gorczyca, an archeologist working for the Museum at Konin (see below).



There is much new research and excavation taking place at Chelmno to document the full

extent of the atrocities committed there, including the murder of the Jews of Gombin. The grave sites are far more extensive than previously realized. Underground furnaces have been discovered, even under the place where the shtetl monuments have been erected. They are also excavating at the site of the former manor house.

**Konin Catholic Cemetery**: The mass grave of Jews from the Konin work camp is unchanged from when we were there in 1999. No new matzevah has been erected.

Gabin Landlovers Association (Towarzystwo Milosnicow Zeimi Gabinskiej, TMZG): I met Mrs. Anna Ostrowska, the new president, and Mr. Borysiak, whom we met in 1999. The museum looked wonderful-somewhat expanded and very clean and orderly. The room with information on Jewish Gabin was somewhat expanded with materials.

Next Steps: At the August meeting, the Board took several steps: We will work with friends in Gombin to form a planning committee for the 2006 trip. We will begin research into placing a monument commemorating the ancient synagogue of Gombin on its original site. This monument might also commemorate the former catholic cathedral that was also destroyed by the Nazis. We might plan for Jewish Gombiner grandchildren to spend some time in Gombin and at Chelmno. We should improve the collection and exhibition of Jewish materials in the Gombin Museum by preparing some posters on important Jewish Gombiners.

My mother Minna has devoted the last five years of her life to creating and distributing a film about the survivors of Gombin, many of whom were our ancestors. Her work traveling across the world to preserve their memory has certainly been a source of inspiration for me, and it is this inspiration that I plan to carry forth into my own future involvement with the Gombin Society.

As a recent college graduate and alumnus of the Birthright Israel program, I have come to realize the value of participating in a Jewish organization, especially one with which I have a personal connection, like the Gombin Society and my cousin Joe's organization, Fuel For Truth.

Many of my peers downplay the importance of their Jewish heritage and take for granted the hardships and sacrifices made by grandparents and great grandparents. I have vowed not to follow this route.

Through my involvement with the Gombin Society and Fuel For Truth, I hope to become one step closer to embracing my ancestry, and strengthening our Jewish community. I look forward to interacting with you all as I strive to reach those goals.

Mindy Prosperi has organized a group trip to Poland scheduled for departure from New York on July 17, 2006 (actual departure date may be 4 days on either side of this date). The 9-day trip includes one full day in Gombin, 4 nights in Warsaw, 3 nights in Krakow, and visits to Chelmno, Auschwitz, and other important sites with professional guides. Travel will be by motor coach. Accommodations are in first-class hotels; most meals are included. Call for details.

The quoted cost, including round-trip airfare, is \$2670 for adults; \$2380 for students age 22 and under. The Society will offer up to 10 partial scholarships toward the trip for Gombiner grand-children who write an essay on some aspect of their family's Gombiner connections.
